Has 2022 been the best year for Squash in New Zealand?

I am always open for a good debate and being challenged and as my squash history is mainly dependent on the great book 'Long and Short', I don't know the answer, however, I am confident it would be a very hard year to beat. Look at the graphics and you will note that we had a New Zealander as world number 1, our best ever Commonwealth Games, over 7,000 people got to witness live the relaunch of the NZ Squash Open in a 1,000 seated arena and one of the most important facts is the recent growth in people playing as club members with numbers recorded as the largest in over a decade.

From Squash NZ office perspective, we began planting seeds over a year ago and during this last year it has been really satisfying watching these seeds sprout and although we have another year of work to view them flower, we are confident and excited about the future look of squash in New Zealand.

Some examples of seeds sprouting include the following:

- Purchasing a glass court from US Squash and the large amount of work with PSA on the relaunch of NZ Squash Open
- Finalising the features and working with our provider in the development of MySquash (will replace iSquash at the start of 2024)
- The completion of Squash NZ Facility Strategy that provides clarity on our priorities and guidance in how to upgrade our clubs over the next 10 years.
- Finalising a new revenue model for Squash NZ and districts that will provides clubs with options to shift the potential future burden of ongoing increases in fees from clubs to adding value in the casual market.
- Clarity in starting new initiatives to grow the number of coaches and attract young New Zealanders to start playing squash.

Our cultural shift for unity/kotahitanga is becoming a reality, the many threads of string are intertwined, and we have formed a rope that is showing strength during times of tension.

I would like to acknowledge and thank our Board, the staff of Squash NZ, all the district boards and administrators and club committee members for all their work over the last year. Special mentions go to Grant and Ellie from G.J Gardner Homes who have invested

in squash and become our first major partner, Aon for their continued support for community and youth development and NZCT, The Lion Foundation and Pub Charity for their ongoing support. Final mention goes to Wayne Werder who I had hundreds of email exchanges and tens and tens of calls with over the year who, along with the talented and hard-working group of volunteers in Tauranga, led the organisation of the amazingly successful Nations Cup and NZ Squash Open.

We are on a journey with a significant milestone looming in 2024 when many of our initiatives are fully realised however the year of 2022 will be looked upon both as a magnificent year of achievements and one that allowed us to spend a lot of time planting and watering for the future of squash in New Zealand!

What did we achieve?

Coaching Courses

Two new online courses went live in 2022 – focused on coaches working with intermediate-level players.

- Skill Learning – aligning to World Squash Coaching Philosophy and the modern approach to coaching.
- Coaching teams – designed for coaches working with superchamps teams.

Bringing online theory to life, practical coaching courses Foundation and Development were delivered in Auckland, Waikato, Eastern, Central, Wellington and Canterbury.

Coaching Forums

With Covid interrupting the early year National Coaching Conference, it was decided to do some regional coaching forums as an alternative, the theme for these forums was to expand the coach's toolbox.

- South Island hosted by Squash City in Invercargill
- Central North Island hosted by SquashGym Palmerston North
- Upper North Island hosted by Devoy Squash & Fitness in Tauranga

Performance coaching

A small group of coaches were invited to attend a workshop during the NZ Open in Tauranga, a great chance to leverage a high-level PSA event. This workshop consisted of live player and match analysis. Thanks to Dave Clarke for facilitating this workshop.

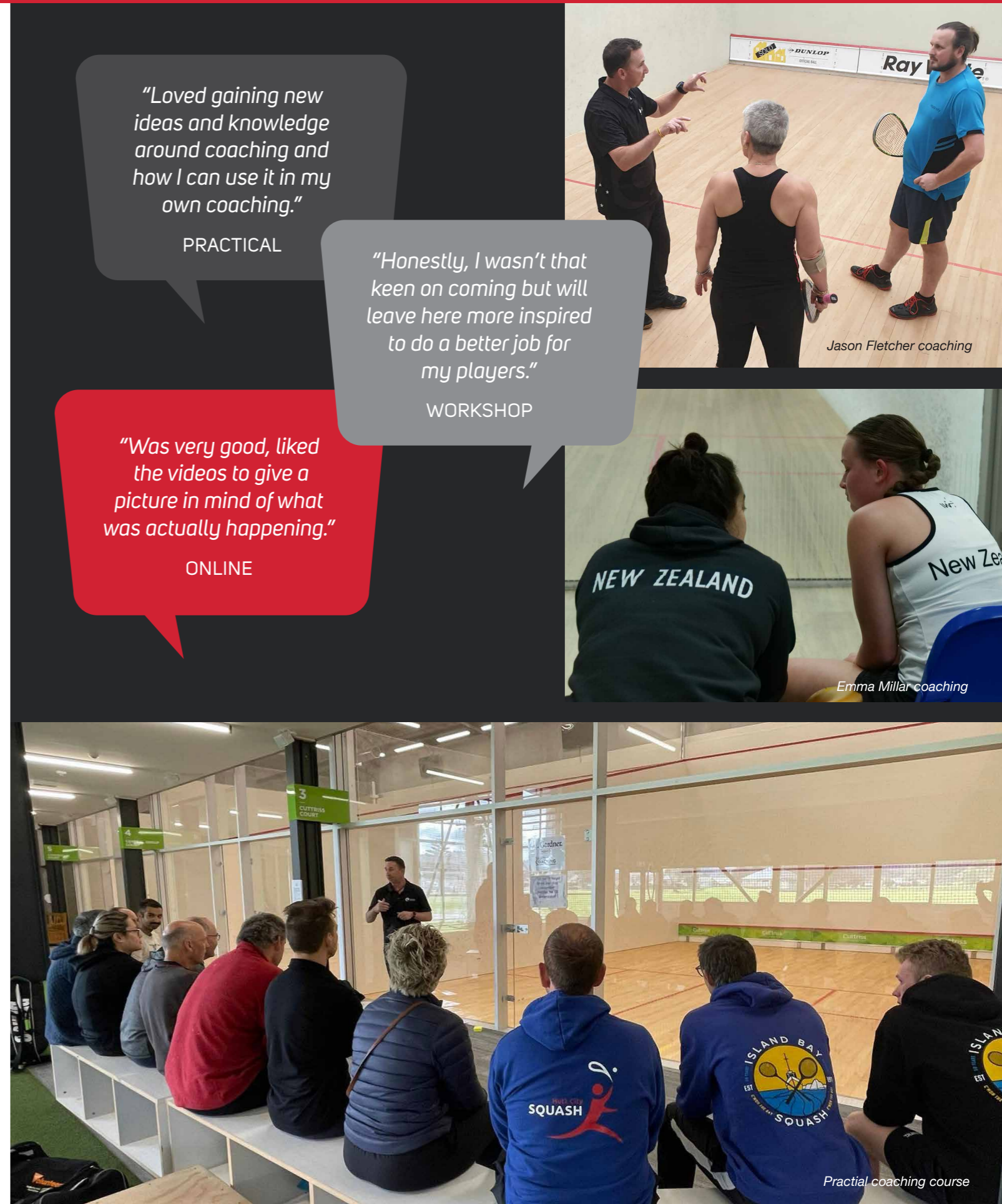
We also had a few coaches able to engage in HPSNZ core knowledge coaching courses.

All the face-to-face learning opportunities were well received, and we received great feedback.

Focus areas for 2023 will be the national coaching conference back on the agenda, additional online and practical modules, and further support for district coach developers.

Racketball

Offered up as a great introduction to squash for beginners or an option to keep those advancing in years on the court, Racketball is continuing to build a following with nationwide promotion beginning in early 2022. Played with a slightly larger racket and a bigger, bouncier ball, Racketball (also known as Squash57) has been adopted by many clubs with club starter kits offered out to allow clubs to have equipment available for players to use.

Key Initiatives

- Racketball page populated on the Squash NZ website in early 2022, with resources for clubs around rules, equipment, doubles, participation ideas, logos, promotional material, social media tiles and FAQs.
- 21 Racketball club kits sold and made available for players by clubs (6 rackets and balls)
- Webinar held to assist clubs with rolling out Racketball, including a presentation by Patrick Osborn from the WSF Squash57 commission.
- First NZ Racketball Festival held at the Royal Oak Racquets Club in Auckland with 24 players taking part. Planning already underway for 2023 event in Waikato.

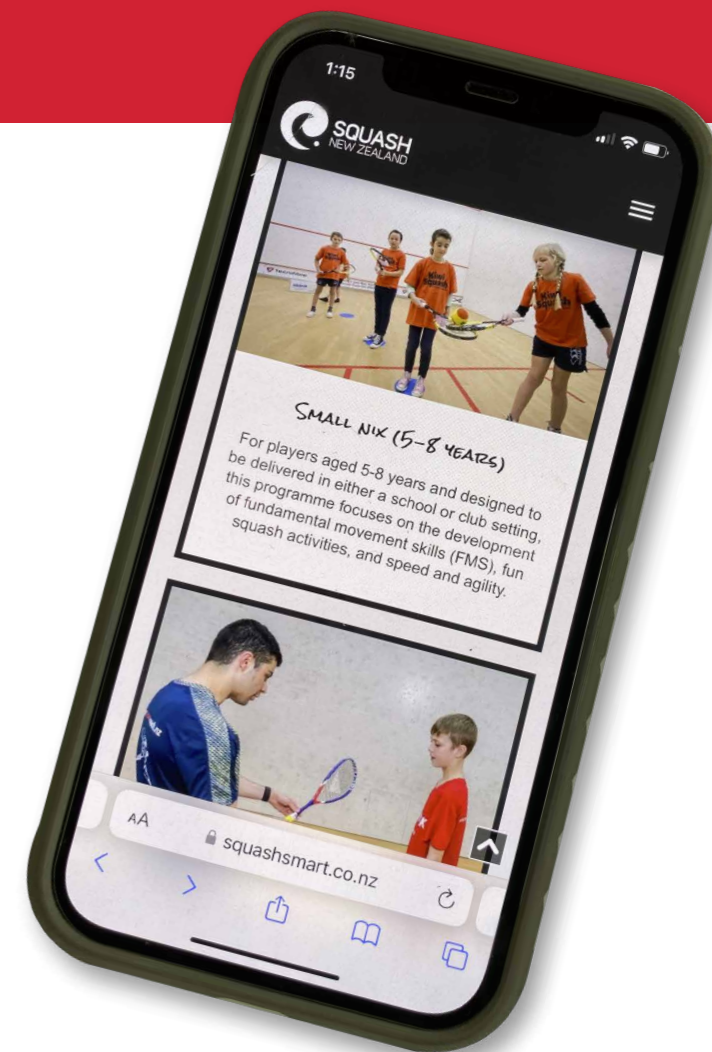
Juniors

A working group was formed in September to develop a National Junior Participation Strategy to grow the number of young people playing squash. With some excellent expertise in the group, a number of initiatives and recommendations were formed and with input from the districts on their existing plans to grow junior numbers, the strategy was presented and adopted in December for implementation in 2023 and 2024.

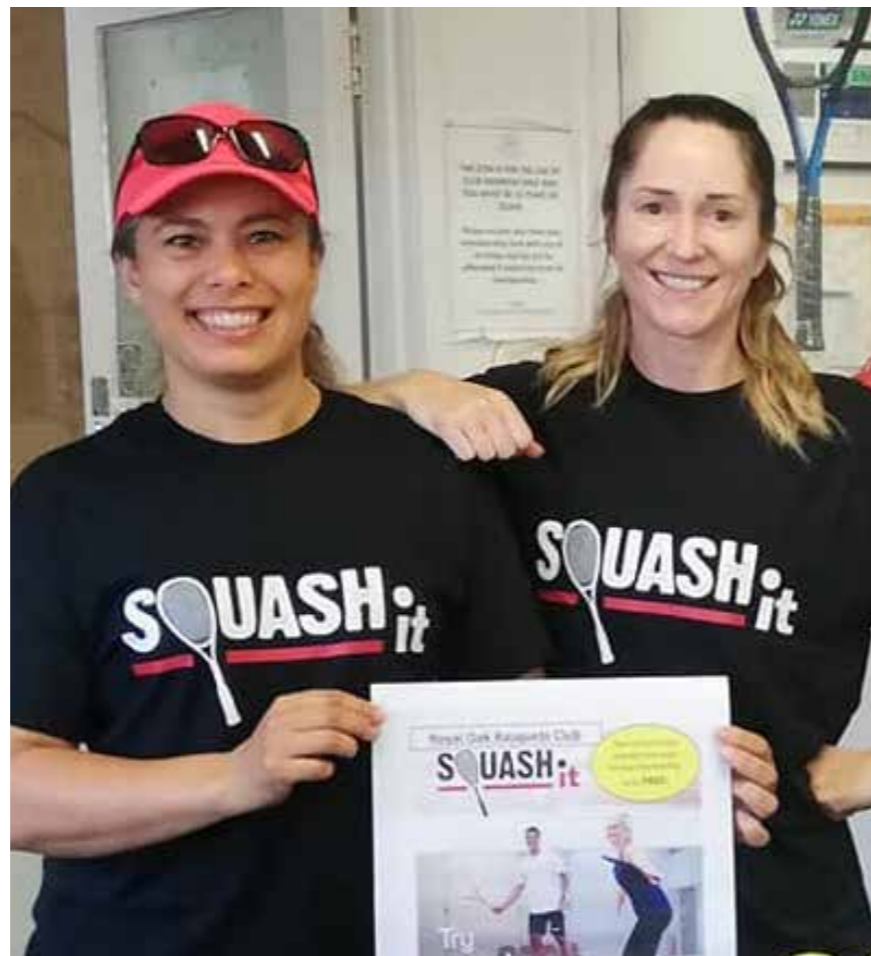
Other highlights :

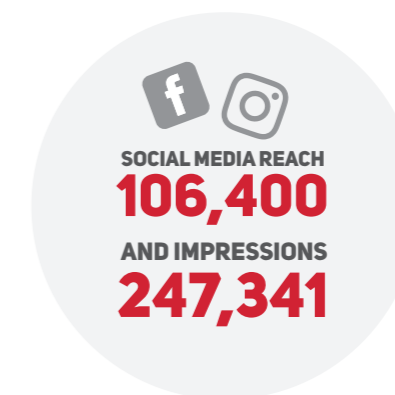

Commonwealth Games Promotion

To leverage off all the attention squash was getting in the media during the CWG, a month-long membership special was advertised and promoted across the country. This gave people who were interested in giving squash a go an easy and affordable opportunity to join their local squash club. Participating clubs had the option of making available a 3-month membership for \$39,

\$69 or \$99 which was sold collectively on the Squash NZ website, along with committing to giving all new members a warm introduction to the club and sessions to get them started on the court. Big congratulations to Geyser City, Ngaruawahia and Matamata who all at least 20 new members sign up!

An online bilingual squash score sheet resource was created for clubs to use, with associated audio translations to teach people the correct pronunciation of common squash related terms used when marking or refereeing a squash match.

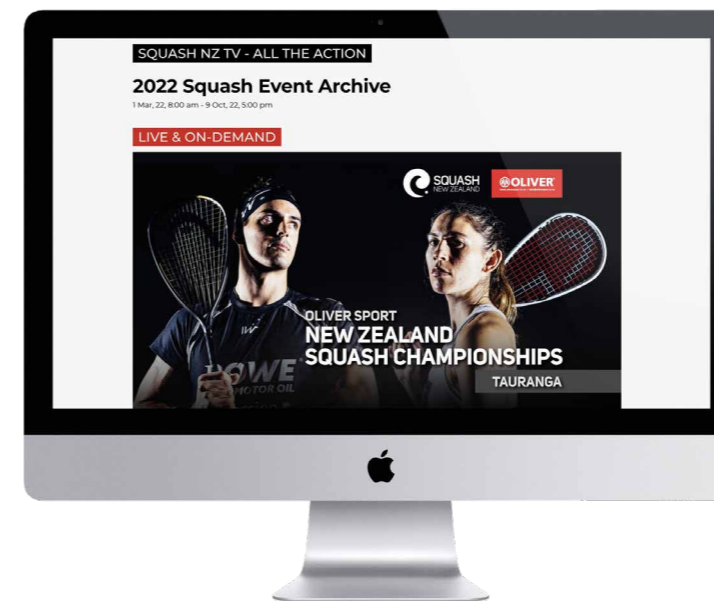

High Performance Programme

The main areas of the HP Programme in 2022 were the success of the HP Pros, the continued progression of the End-to-End Pathway (E2E) and the resurgence of world championship campaigns after two years of disruption from Covid. The HPSNZ funding significantly increased from 2021 due in large part to the performances of Paul Coll and Joelle King, development of the E2E and the 2022 Commonwealth Games.



Paul Coll

Paul Coll attained the number one world ranking in March 2022, the first New Zealand male squash player to achieve this. He is the current British Open Champion and 2022 Commonwealth Games double gold medallist.

End-to-End Pathway

In 2022 the End-to-End Pathway (E2E) continued to be brought to life in all stages of the pathway. Districts play an important role in supporting district talent by running district programmes, camps, and district representative teams.

Development

At the development stage are players aiming for NZ representation and the PSA world tour. In 2022 the domestic PSA events and World Junior Championships in France proved valuable international experience for this group of players. These events enabled our players to be tested on the world stage and understand the level of international squash and what is required to stay competitive with the rest of the world.

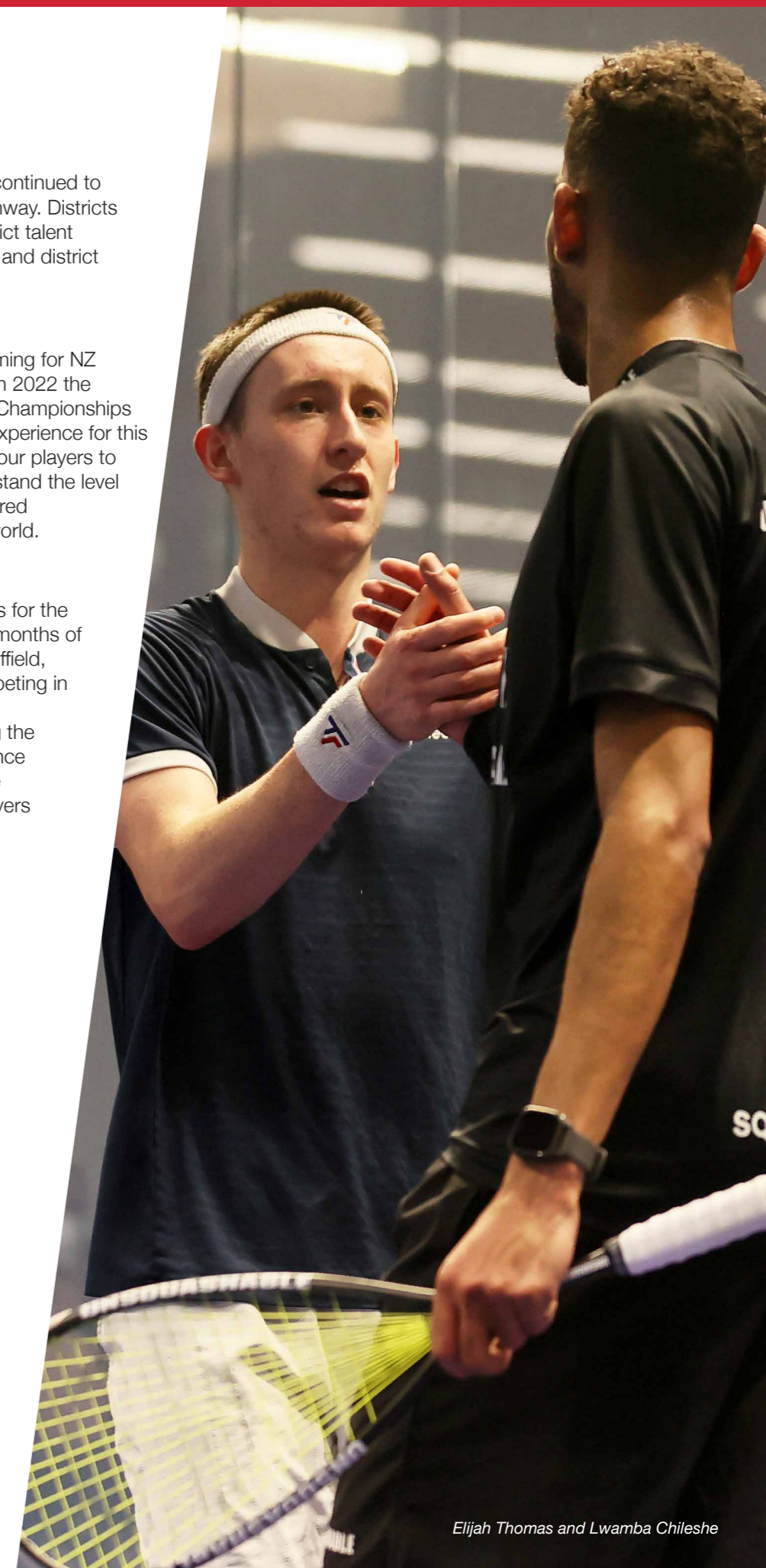
Emerging Pros

The Emerging Pros were based overseas for the northern hemisphere squash season (9 months of the year) at their respective bases in Sheffield, Edinburgh, Doncaster, and Prague competing in PSA tournaments and high-level league competitions. SNZ continued supporting the Emerging Pros with coaching, performance support, travel, and the promotion of the domestic PSA events, aiming to see players jump into the Pro stage of the pathway (top 50) in the next 12-18 months.

BIRMINGHAM, ENGLAND, 28TH JULY – 8TH AUGUST

The 2022 Commonwealth Games campaign was incredibly successful, with New Zealand topping the squash medal table by winning three gold medals: the most ever at the Games.

Despite some setbacks, the team cohesion and support wrapped around the players allowed for them to rise above it. The Campaign Lead Coach was Glen Wilson and Assistant Coach/Manager Paul Hornsby.

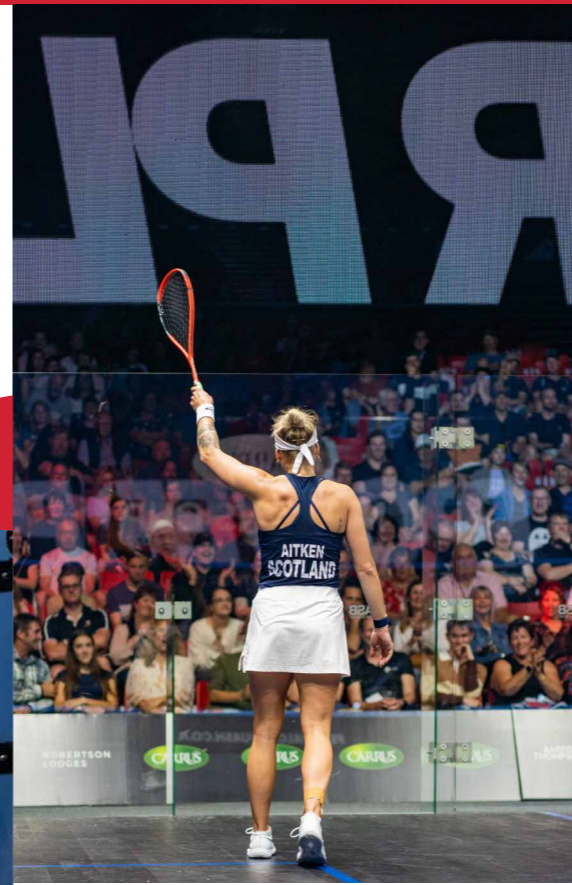

Each player had the option to use a 'Power Play' twice per match where they could win two points.

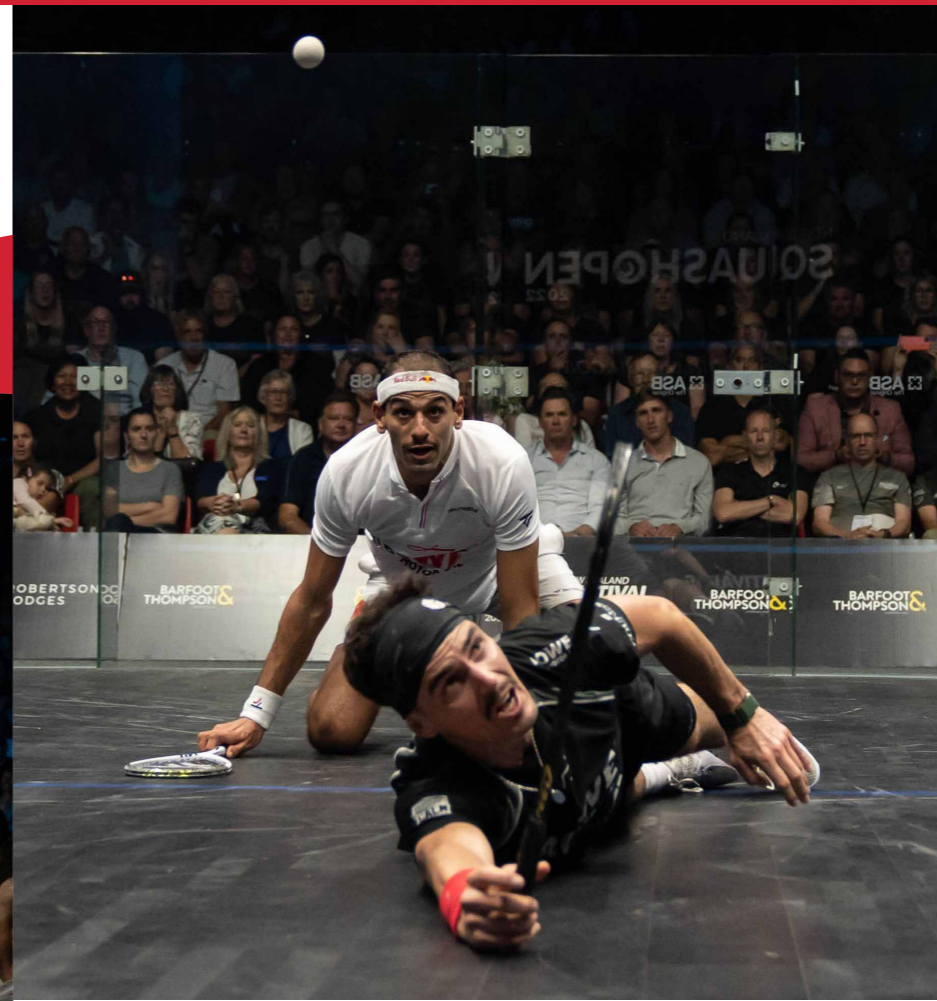

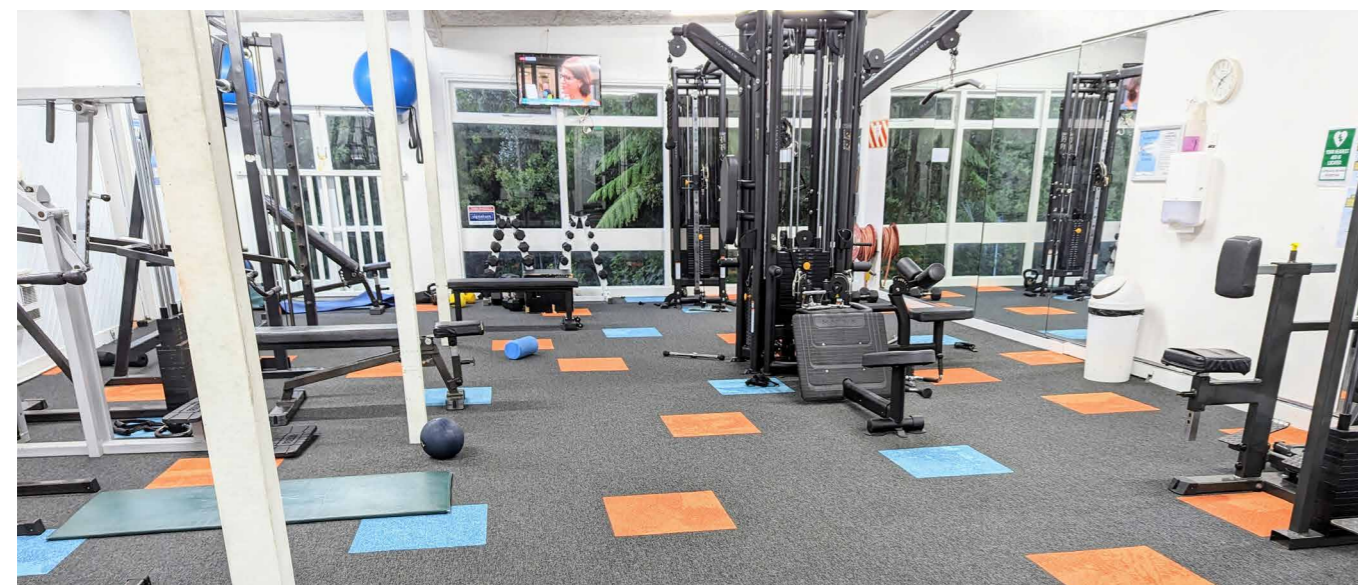
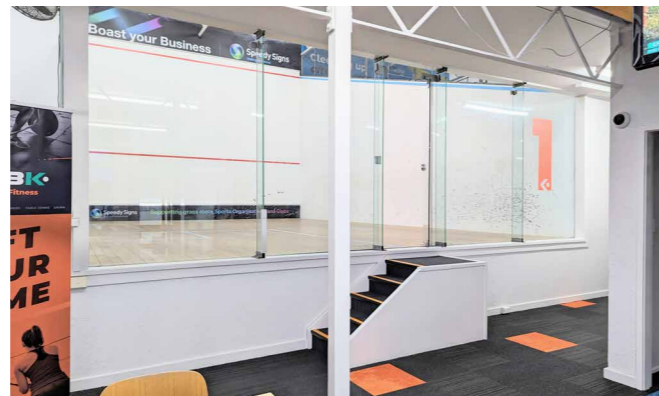

Sending our Referees abroad with the knowledge that they will perform equally with overseas officials does not come cheap and we would like to thank HPSNZ for their continuing support. 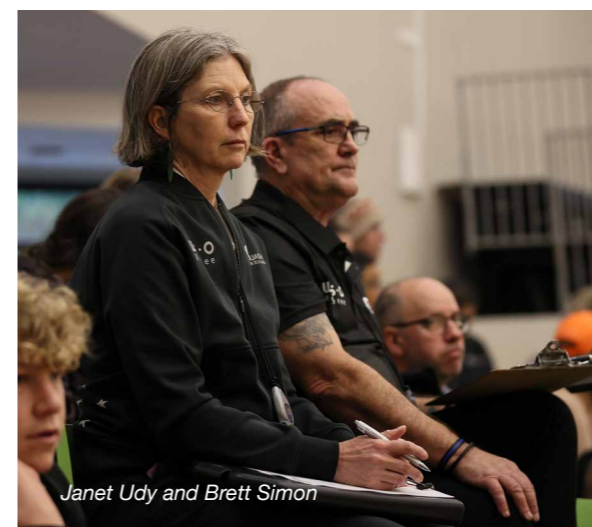
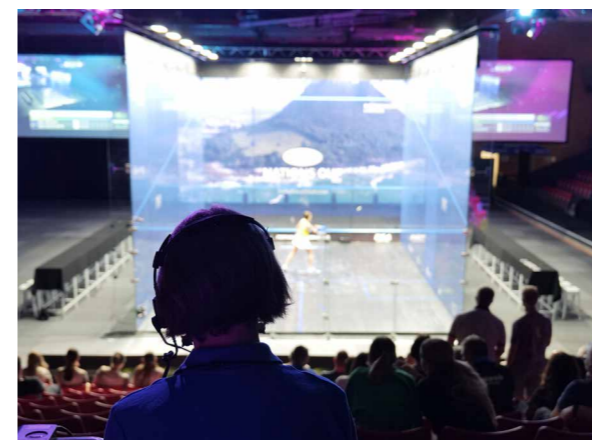

- Overall Interclub numbers continue to go from strength to strength, a major focus point for many of our clubs.



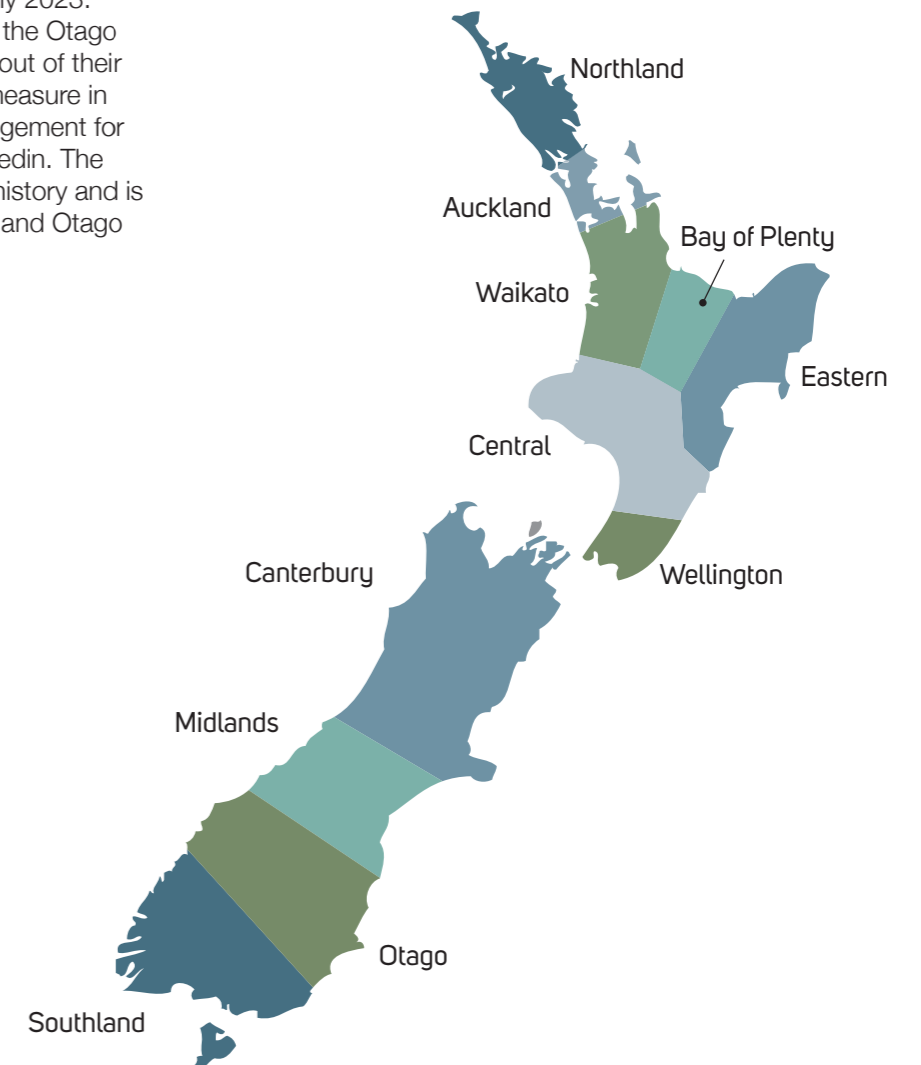
Southland Coaching Practical

Glen Wilson has had a large impact on the sport from his playing days through to coaching and growing the game.

Glen first played at Maidstone Squash Club in Upper Hutt and went on to win the U13 age group titles in 1982 and 83. He then continued with U15, U17 and U19 in successive years before winning the New Zealand national men's title in 1990, 1991 and returning to take the title again in 2003.

The success didn't stop at national level as Wilson gained a top world ranking of 25 and went on to represent New Zealand at three Commonwealth Games, 1998, 2002 and 2006. He claimed bronze in the mixed doubles with Sarah Cook at Kuala Lumpur and gold at Manchester in 2002 with Leilani Joyce.

There was also a mixed doubles silver medal with Shelley Kitchen at the 2004 World Doubles Champions.

Wilson represented New Zealand for 15 years from 1991 to 2006 and then took on various coaching roles around the world before returning to New Zealand and becoming a national selector in 2015, a role he still holds until today. There has also been positions as New Zealand women's head coach, junior head coach, world doubles head coach, men's head coach in 2019 where they finished fifth and the successful head coach of the 2018 and 2022 Commonwealth Games team.

Murray Day

Murray Day, who led New Zealand Squash Rackets Association from 1968-1971 and became the President of the International Squash Rackets Federation (now World Squash Federation) from 1975-1981, passed away in 2022 aged 90. He was also the inaugural President of the Oceania Squash Federation from 1992-1995.

Murray was made a life member of the NZ Squash Rackets Association in 1976, the Squash Rackets Association (England) in 1977, and the Oceania Squash Federation in 1997. He was made an honorary member of the International Squash Rackets Federation in 1981, and was an inaugural inductee into the New Zealand Squash Hall of Fame in 2009.

In the 1981 New Year Honours, Murray was appointed an Officer of the Order of the British Empire, for services to squash

Murray will be sadly missed by the squash community at his home club Hamilton Squash & Tennis Club (where he spent time as club member, committee member, Secretary, President, and Patron), across New Zealand and around the world.

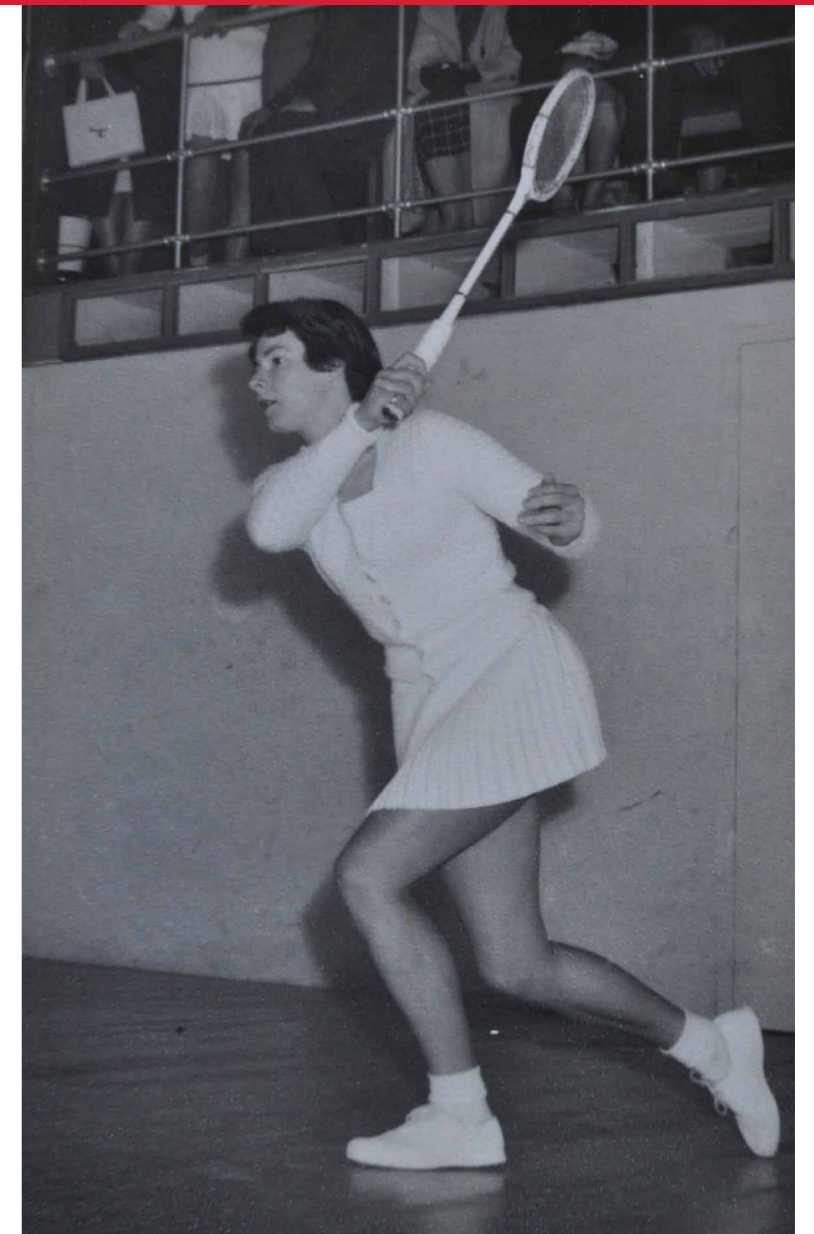


Ann Stephens

Squash NZ Hall of Fame member Ann Stephens (nee Mackenzie) passed away in 2022 aged 89.

For 15 years Ann was the leading New Zealand women's player. Playing an athletic, robust game she won five New Zealand titles in from 1956-63 and represented New Zealand between 1960-68.

Ann was part of Mitchell Cup-winning teams with Oamaru and Hamilton. Her record was impressive particularly as she divided her time between squash and badminton, at which she was also a New Zealand champion. In 1957 she played in both sports' national championships on the same weekend.



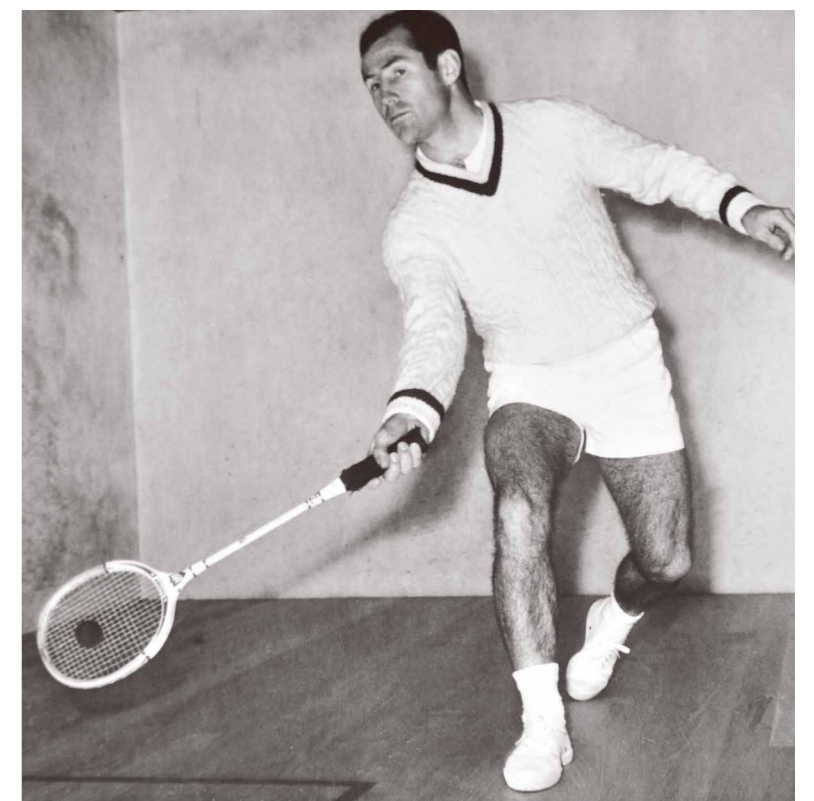
Charlie Waugh

New Zealand squash icon of the 1960's Charlie Waugh passed away age 84 in 2022. The proud Manawatu player attended Palmerston North Boys High School, also excelled with a tennis racket.

Waugh quickly became known for his speed around the squash court and along with his skill on the court led him to five consecutive national titles 1960-64.

Waugh was regarded as the first New Zealand-born player to make an impact against top overseas competitors and even beat the likes of Geoff Hunt and Ken Hiscoe. He also competed against the likes of Jonah Barrington (England) and Pakistan's Aftab Jawaid as well in tournaments such as the British Open and British Amateur Championships.

He was a member of the New Zealand team on several occasions at World Teams Championships, including in 1971 as a 33-year-old. Charlie was inducted into the New Zealand Squash Hall of Fame in 2010.

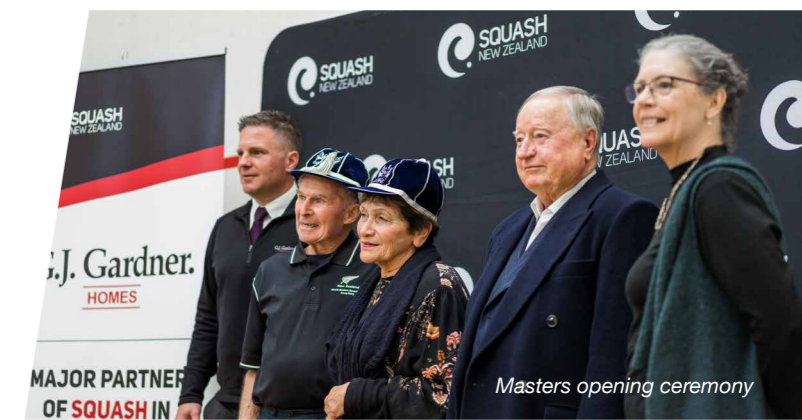

Statement of Accounting Policies

Squash New Zealand For the year ended 31 December 2022

1. Reporting Entity

Squash New Zealand (Inc), formerly New Zealand Squash (Inc) is the New Zealand national sporting organisation responsible for the control, advancement and regulation of the game of squash throughout New Zealand. The name of the entity changed, 08 April 2019. Squash New Zealand (Inc) is incorporated under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908. The consolidated financial statements comprising Squash New Zealand Inc and its controlled entity Club Kelburn, together the Group, are presented for the year ended 31 December 2022.

2. Basis of Preparation

Squash New Zealand ("Squash New Zealand") has elected to prepare special purpose financial statements primarily for the members. It is considered by the Board to be an appropriate format on which to prepare the Association's financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2022. The Financial statements are prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

3. Impact of COVID-19

The continuous outbreak of COVID-19 throughout the country had a medium impact on Squash NZ operations and business particularly in the first half of 2022, primarily disrupting some of our events and participation numbers.

4. Measurement Base

The accounting principles recognised as appropriate for the measurement and reporting of earnings and financial position on a historical cost basis have been followed. Accrual accounting is used to match income and expenditure.

5. Specific Accounting Policies

The following specific accounting policies which materially affect the measurement of financial performance and of financial position have been applied:

5.1 Operating Leases

Operating lease payments, where the lessors effectively retain substantially all the risks and benefits of ownership of the leased items, are recognised in the determination of operating profit in equal instalments over the term of the lease (refer Note 11).

5.2 Inventory

Inventory for Squash New Zealand has been valued at average cost or cost. Club Kelburn inventory is valued on a weighted average basis.

5.3 Goods and Services Tax (GST)

The entity is registered for GST. All amounts are stated exclusive of goods and services tax (GST) except for accounts payable and accounts receivable which are stated inclusive of GST.

5.4 Income Tax

Squash New Zealand Inc is exempt for Income Tax as an amateur sports club, under Income Tax Act 2007, No 97, s CW 46.

5.5 Bank Accounts and Cash

Bank accounts and cash in the Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash balances and bank balances (including short term deposits) with original maturities of 90 days or less.

5.6 Fixed Assets

All fixed assets are recorded at cost less accumulated depreciation to date.

5.7 Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated on a diminishing value basis or straight-line method on all properties. Some plant and equipment are provided at rates that will write-off the cost of the assets to their estimated residual values over their useful lives. The associated depreciation rates for each class of assets are as follows:

5.8 Intangible assets

Intangible assets acquired separately are measured on initial recognition at cost. The cost of intangible assets acquired in a non-exchange transaction is their fair value at the date of the exchange.

Following initial recognition, intangible assets are carried at cost less any accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment losses.

The useful lives of intangible assets are assessed as either finite or indefinite. Intangible assets with finite lives are amortised over the useful economic life and assessed for impairment whenever there is an indication that the intangible asset may be impaired. A review is made at least at the end of each financial period.

The amortisation expense on intangible assets with finite lives is recognised in surplus or deficit as the expense category that is consistent with the function of the intangible assets. Squash NZ does not hold any intangible assets that have an indefinite life.

6. Investments

Investments are loans advanced to clubs for renovations and development and are stated at cost less any provisions or write-offs (refer Note 4).

7. Foreign Currencies

Transactions in foreign currencies are converted at the New Zealand rate of exchange at the date of the transaction. At balance date foreign monetary assets and liabilities are translated at the closing rate, and exchange variations arising from these transactions are included in the statement of financial performance as operating items.

8. Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefit will flow to the Association and revenue can be reliably measured. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received. The following specific recognition criteria must be met before revenue is recognised.

8.1 Affiliation Levies

Squash New Zealand (Inc) receives levies from affiliated clubs throughout New Zealand. Revenue is recognised annually in the period they are due.

8.2 Grants and other similar revenue

Grant revenue includes grants given by other charitable organisations, philanthropic organisations and businesses. Grant revenue is recognised when the conditions attached to the grant has been compiled with. Where there are unfulfilled conditions attaching to the grant, the amount relating to the unfulfilled condition is recognised as a liability and released to income as the conditions are fulfilled. Sponsorship revenue is recognised upon receipt, for the term of the contract.

8.3 Interest Revenue

Interest revenue is recognised as it accrues.

8.4 Club Kelburn membership fees

Membership fees are recognised as revenue upon receipt, at the start of membership. There is no ability for a member to seek a refund of fees, unless there is an exceptional circumstance.

9. Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies. Policies have been applied on a consistent basis with those of the previous reporting period.

11. Commitments And Contingent Liabilities

In March 2019 the World Squash Federation granted New Zealand hosting rights of the 2021 World Men's Team Championships, which did not eventuate and resulted in the cancellation of the event. Bay of Plenty Major Squash Events in partnership with Squash New Zealand, following a closed tender bid, was successful to host the 2023 World Men's Team Championships in Tauranga.

Squash New Zealand has remained committed to providing \$50,000 towards the event costs. The hosting fee of \$21,262 has already been paid to WSF by Squash New Zealand in 2019/20. A further \$10,238 has been paid to Bay of Plenty Major Squash Events in 2020. The remaining \$18,500 is a contractual commitment of Squash New Zealand required to be paid in the 2023 financial year.

Squash New Zealand committed \$300,000 in reserves to complete remedial work of the site at Club Kelburn to be repaid over 4-5 years. Club Kelburn has already paid back \$200,000.

12. Joint Venture

On 4 March 2022, Squash New Zealand and Squash Auckland started a Joint Venture to manage and administrate the operations of the National Squash Centre, to increase utilisation of the Centre and enhance the experience for participants. There has not been any amount of investment from Squash New Zealand, neither is expecting any profit or loss from the venture, it also is noted that the lease of the "National Squash Center" will expire on February 2024, at which point the joint venture will likely cease.

13. Additional Information

The Fraser Courts have been totally depreciated last year and have been transferred to Hutt City Communities Trust, to their contractual net realisable value of \$1 as at 30 June 2021.

Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the Members those matters we are required to state to them in an auditor's report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the Members as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

Board's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

The Board are responsible on behalf of the entity for determining that the Special Purpose framework adopted is acceptable in Squash New Zealand Incorporated's circumstances, the preparation of financial statements, and for such internal control as the Board determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.
